**Phereas*, representing the most important holiday observed by Asian and Pacific Islander communities, the Lunar New Year – or Spring Festival – traces back over millennia as the means by which to mark the passage of time based upon the cyclical pattern of agricultural production, and so this longest holiday of the year originally represented the period of time when farmers could enjoy a deserved rest from their work in the fields to be with their families; and

Example 125, according to custom, the Lunar New Year begins with the new moon on the first day of the first lunar month, this year on February 12th, and ends fifteen days later with the full moon on February 26th, and the celebration of the traditional Lantern Festival; we hail the "Year of the Ox," the second animal sign of the zodiac – symbolizing prosperity through hard work and diligence – as those born under this sign exemplify the qualities of fortitude, resilience, patience, determination, and dependability; and
